

From the Pastor

I want to start this article local - I was absolutely blown away by our Triduum services. We had good attendance at the Holy Thursday and Good Friday liturgies and about our normal weekend mass attendance at the Vigil and 7 a.m. Easter masses, so I was going to be happy with however many people were at the 9 a.m. mass. The church was filled past our seating capacity, so I am amazed by the turnout, by those who did so much to help with our celebrations, and I am very grateful.

I also am grateful for the life and service of Pope Francis. Pope Francis has been the only pope for my ministry as a priest, and I hope I can honor his legacy of service, of emphasizing the missionary responsibility of the church, and his deep devotion to Mary, even as we prepare for the election of the next pontiff.

The general rules for electing a pope have been the same for about a thousand years following the Gregorian Reforms. Upon the death of a pope, the Church begins a period of official mourning that lasts 9 days (so we will have an extra mass at 8:00 a.m. this Monday). During that time, the Cardinals gather in Rome. The seat of Peter is empty - we use the Latin phrase sede vacante - so many of the higher level operations of the Church are put on pause. So for example, this weekend we were supposed to have a few people declared Saints - their canonizations are delayed until there is a new Pope. If a bishop wants to resign, he must wait as there is no one to resign to, etc. During the *sede vacante* the Cardinals govern by committee, but they are only to do the basics and what is necessary to get ready to do their main priority - electing a new pope.

To do so they will gather 15 or 20 days after Francis' death in conclave. That means they meet (the Sistine Chapel is the usual site but other places have been chosen in prior centuries) and hold votes. The Cardinals take an oath of secrecy equivalent to that of the seal of the confessional and at the start of the conclave the ranking Cardinal-deacon will announce "Extra omnes" - everyone get out - unless you're part of the conclave. The pope is elected by a two-thirds majority and the cardinals will vote twice the first day and then up to 4 times a day until they come to a decision. They will have a day of reflection if they are unable to come to a decision after the first ten ballots, and another one if no one is elected after another seven. If in the unlikely event they take 33 ballots (so 8 full days of voting) the top two candidates at that point are engaged in a run-off election. The ballots are burned producing black smoke, and when someone is successfully elected they add a chemical to make the smoke white.

To be Pope, the only qualification is being a baptized male, however the last non-Cardinal elected was over 600 years ago and most of the non-bishops elected Pope were done so prior to the Gregorian Reforms, when the Archdeacon of Rome was considered the heir apparent. Pray for the Cardinals that they may be guided by the Holy Spirit and pray for the repose of the soul of Pope Francis.

DEVOTIONS, EXPLAINED! Sprinkling Rite

The rite of sprinkling, also called the Asperges rite, describes the act of sprinkling the congregation with holy water, an action which recalls the new life we received in the waters of our baptism.

If this rite is performed during Mass, it takes the place of the penitential act.

The sprinkling rite usually takes place on Sundays during the Easter season but is permitted on any Sunday. When it is completed, the congregation sings the Gloria.

The name "asperges" comes from the first line of Psalm 51, a penitential psalm that begins with the words "Have mercy on me." In the Extraordinary Form of the Mass, the Asperges rite is done before each principal Mass, except on Palm Sunday.

The tool used by the priest to sprinkle the congregation is called the aspergillum, and the bucket containing the water is called the aspersorium. ©LPi



Sunday, April 27, 2025 Believe!

Today's readings: Acts 5:12–16; Psalm 118:2–4, 13–15, 22–24; Revelation 1:9–11a, 12–13, 17–19; John 20:19–31. Jesus appears to the disciples, who were in hiding because they were being persecuted for being his followers. Despite the locked doors, Jesus "came and stood in their midst," bidding them peace. Thomas, who was not with the other disciples when Jesus first appeared, says that he will not believe unless he sees the mark of the nails in Jesus' hands and puts his finger into his side.

Since we know that Jesus was raised from the dead, it is easy to place blame on Thomas. How could he not believe? But when we reflect on our faith journey, how many times do we find ourselves in Thomas' shoes? How often do we doubt and question God's presence? On this Sunday of

Divine Mercy, place yourself in the Gospel. Where do you find yourself? What do you think when Thomas expresses his disappointment and fear? What do you feel when Jesus comes, despite the locked doors, stands in your midst, and says: "Peace be with you?" What do you see when Jesus invites Thomas to touch the mark of the nails in his hands and put his hand into his side? What do you hear exclaimed in the room?

After placing yourself in the locked room with the disciples and Thomas, full of fear and sadness, consider how Jesus' resurrection can inspire you. How can you step through fear and doubt and move toward action? Ask the Lord to meet you where you are and to bring you peace.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 28 Completely Yours

Today the Church observes the optional Memorial of St. Louis Grignion de Montfort, a diocesan priest who served primarily throughout western France. He preached a devotion to Mary and encouraged imitating Mary's continuous acceptance of God's will for her life: his personal motto was totus tuus, or "completely yours." In honor of St. Louis de Montfort, consider how you might say yes to God every day this week. How can you embody totus tuus? *Today's readings: Acts 4:23–31; Psalm 2:1–3, 4–7a, 7b–9; John 3:1–8.*

Tuesday, April 29 St. Catherine of Siena

From a young age, Catherine of Siena had visions of Jesus and committed herself to him. After spending time in solitary contemplation, she realized that loving God and serving others went hand in hand. She dedicated herself to serving others, including the imprisoned. Catherine of Siena was the first woman to be published in one of the Italian dialects. To celebrate her today, say a prayer dedicating yourself to loving God, and commit to an act of service. *Today's readings: Acts* 4:32–37; *Psalm 93:1ab, 1cd–2, 5; John 3:7b–15*.

Wednesday, April 30 St. Pius V

St. Pius V served the sick and impoverished and requested to donate excess money to those in need. As pope, he was tasked with implementing the decrees of the Council of Trent, reforming errors and reaffirming the teachings of the Church. He dedicated much time to establishing seminaries for the proper training of priests and opportunities for the education of the laity. Spend some time learning more about our faith. *Today's readings: Acts 5:17–26; Psalm 34:2–3, 4–5, 6–7, 8–9; John 3:16–21.*

Thursday, May 1 St. Joseph the Worker

Today we celebrate St. Joseph, the man who worked as a carpenter. He used his gifts and skills to provide for his family's needs and passed on his trade to Jesus. Spend time reflecting on those who have taught you about your faith and your trade or career. How can you dedicate your skills to participate in the life of God's creation? How does celebrating St. Joseph the Worker honor work, especially work with the hands? *Today's readings: Acts 5:27–33; Psalm 34:2 and 9, 17–18, 19–20; John 3:31–36; or Genesis 1:26—2:3 or Colossians 3:14–15, 17, 23–24; Matthew 13:54–58.*

Friday, May 2 St. Athanasius

St. Athanasius spent his life defending the divinity of Jesus, despite being persecuted and exiled for it. He dedicated himself to the service of the Church, which included writings on the establishment of monastic life for the Western Christian world. Today, say a prayer in gratitude for the ability to practice your faith. *Today's readings: Acts 5:34–42; Psalm 27:1*, *4*, *13–14; John 6:1–15*.

Sts. Philip and James

Today, we celebrate Sts. Philip and James, though we know more about Philip. He was called directly by Jesus to be one of his apostles. He needed time to come to know who Jesus was. This evening, read John 6:1–15. Philip's reply to Jesus in verse 7 shows us his human concern. How have you let your human concerns get in the way of seeing Jesus at work in your life? Ask God for the strength to put aside whatever is keeping you from coming to know Jesus. *Today's readings:* 1 Corinthians 15:1–8; Psalm 19:2–3, 4–5; John 14:6–14.
