

From the Pastor

Congratulations to those who will be receiving their first Eucharist this weekend! As I'm planning and hopefully did preach on, the Eucharist is called communion because it creates communion; with our Lord, truly and substantially present in the host we receive, with others, and with ourselves.

This week we are invited particularly to unite our prayers with the college of Cardinals, as they enter conclave to elect the new Bishop of Rome, our Holy Father. As a seminarian during the last conclave, I remember a bunch of us tried to do extra penances and prayers: sleeping on the floor, following the Catholic fasting rules, late night holy hours to time with the ballot takings, etc. While this time around, I may be older and so less willing to go be austere, I do think praying for the Cardinals is a very good idea, and spending time with our Lord in Eucharistic adoration, stopping by church, attending mass and receiving the Eucharist; these things are always good, and even more so as we are called to pray in these times.

Upon the election of the next pope - no conclave since Leo XIII (the typical pope used to date the "modern" period who was elected in 1878) has lasted longer than 4 days, the bells here at church will peal for a half hour (or at 7 a.m. if he is elected in the morning ballots which would be like 2 a.m. here), and if it's a weekday we will have a celebratory mass at 7:00 p.m. that night. Bringing things back to the Eucharist, one of the older titles of the Pope is vicar of Christ - the Pope is meant to represent Christ here on earth and keep us united in our service of Him. That is also a great analogy of the Eucharist, except the Eucharist is Christ here on earth and draws us more fully into unity with God.

PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Parish Council Elections will take place next weekend -May 10 and 11. The process for elections has been modified this year. Parishioners will be asked to nominate up to 3 people for the council. The person with the highest number of nominations will be asked if they will accept the nomination and serve on the Parish Council, then the person with the next highest number of nominations, likewise, and on down the line until the 3 positions are filled. There will not be a second "election ballot" process. Please carefully read the position description below and prayerfully consider whether you might nominate yourself or someone else for this position. There are three member's terms expiring this year: Clark Grotte, Jim Penick and Stacy Glass. Clark and Jim are completing their first term and are eligible for re-election; Stacy is completing her second term and is ineligible for re-election. You will be asked to nominate 3 people on the ballot.

POSITION DESCRIPTION

Position Title: Parish Pastoral Advisory Council Member

Responsible to: Pastor and Fellow Parishioners

Works with: Pastor, other Pastoral Council members, parish staff, trustees, and auxiliary groups within the parish.

Purpose of the Position: This position serves in an advisory capacity to the Pastor along with other Pastoral Council

Responsibilities: This position is responsible to research the needs, concerns, hopes and activities of the Parish and to bring these to the Pastoral Advisory Council for discussion and recommendations which will allow the Pastor to carry out his leadership role in the parish. You may be asked to take an office on the council; Chairman, Vice-Chair, or Secretary, as voted by fellow council members. You may also be asked to serve as a liaison to one of the subcommittees. These positions change annually.

Qualifications: This person must be a registered parishioner of St. John the Baptist Parish and a practicing Catholic in full communion with the Church. Full-time parish employees are ineligible to be members of the Parish Pastoral Council.

Amount of Time Required: Meetings are held monthly, lasting approximately 2 hours. The date and times of the meetings will be determined by the Pastor. You may also be asked to attend further meetings, retreats, or gatherings as determined by the Pastor.

When and Where the Ministry is Performed: The Pastoral Council meets in the parish social hall.

Length of Commitment: The council member will serve a 3-year term, beginning in June of any given year, and ending in June, 3 years later. Council members are limited to two consecutive - 3 year terms. Once you have served two consecutive - 3 year terms, you are ineligible for re-election for 1

Training Provided: No specific training is necessary to hold the council position, but you may be required to attend further training or retreats as requested.

Responsible To: Each council member is responsible to report to the Pastor, as head of the Pastoral Advisory Council.

DEVOTIONS, EXPLAINED! The Rosary

Christians have used beads to mark the recitation of prayers since ancient times. In the 12th century, the Rosary emerged as a meditative devotion centering on significant moments in the lives of Jesus and Mary. In the words of St. Leo XIII, "there is no more excellent way of praying."

The Rosary is traditionally attributed to a Marian vision received by St. Dominic de Guzman (1170-1221). Though scholarship on this point is uncertain, the Dominican Order was undoubtedly crucial in establishing and evangelizing the Rosary as a devotional prayer.

Over the centuries, the formula of the devotion eventually took the shape of 50 Hail Marys divided into five "decades," with each decade focused on a different mystery. The Church has defined the Joyful Mysteries (to be recited on Saturdays and Mondays), the Glorious Mysteries (Sundays and Wednesdays), the Sorrowful Mysteries (Tuesdays and Fridays), and most recently the Luminous Mysteries (to be recited on Thursdays).





Sunday, May 4, 2025 Do You Love Him?

Today's readings: Acts 5:27–32, 40b–41; Psalm 30:2, 4, 5–6, 11–12, 13; Revelation 5:11–14; John 21:1–19 or John 21:1–14. Today, we hear about Jesus revealing himself to his disciples for a third time after the resurrection. He shows up on an average day, as the disciples do their work. They are struggling to catch fish, and he directs them to cast their net on the right side of the boat. After they do so, they are unable to pull the net because of the number of fish they have caught. So Jesus is recognized: "It is the Lord." He invites them to break bread with him.

When they finish their breakfast, Jesus asks Peter: "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?"

Peter replies with a resounding "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus asks the same question twice more, perhaps because Peter denied him three times during the passion. Each time Peter replies yes, Jesus instructs the disciple to feed or tend the Lord's sheep.

It is a blessing to reflect on the many ways Jesus appears to us. We know he is present in the Word and in the Eucharist, but today we are reminded that he also appears to us in ordinary ways. When he appears to you in your day-to-day routines and asks you if you love him, what do you say to him? Is your response timid or resounding? How do you feed his lambs or tend his sheep?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, May 5 Food for Eternal Life

Jesus tells the crowd searching for him in Capernaum that they should "not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life." Consider what you dedicate yourself to throughout the day. Do you spend your time focusing on earthly desires? What inspires you to say yes to the Lord? Why do you choose to follow him? This evening, spend time praying about your relationship with God. Ask for the strength to set your focus on "the food that endures for eternal life." *Today's readings: Acts 6:8–15; Psalm 119:23–24, 26–27, 29–30; John 6:22–29.*

Tuesday, May 6 When Preaching Is Challenging

Stephen concludes his discourse angrily, calling out those around him as "stiff-necked" and opposing the Spirit. The people Stephen addresses are infuriated and begin to stone him. Stephen, "filled with the Holy Spirit," is given the strength he needs to face his martyrdom. Reflect on times you have struggled to preach the Gospel. What has been challenging for you? Ask for the strength to wholeheartedly follow the Lord. *Today's readings: Acts 7:51—8:1a; Psalm 31:3cd-4, 6 and 7b and 8a, 17 and 21ab; John 6:30–35.*

Wednesday, May 7 There Was Great Joy

After Stephen is martyred, "a severe persecution of the Church in Jerusalem" broke out. Those who followed Jesus were "scattered throughout the countryside" and "went about preaching the word." We are told that Philip goes to Samaria to preach the Word. Despite being persecuted, the crowds experience great joy because of Philip's ministry. When you are persecuted or put down by life's struggles, to whom or to what do you turn for "great joy"? *Today's readings: Acts* 8:1b-8; *Psalm* 66:1-3a, 4-5, 6-7a; *John* 6:35-40.

Thursday, May 8 Called to Serve

In today's first reading, from Acts, an angel of the Lord and the Spirit guide Philip to minister to an Ethiopian court official. Philip proclaims Jesus to him by explaining Scripture and baptizing him. When have you felt called to serve someone else? Ask God for the wisdom to hear and the courage to respond when you are being called to serve another. *Today's readings: Acts* 8:26–40; *Psalm* 66:8–9, 16–17, 20; John 6:44–51.

Friday, May 9 Instruments

Today's first reading begins with Saul "still breathing murderous threats" against the disciples. Despite the atrocities Saul has committed, the Lord describes him to Ananias as "a chosen instrument." Saul is eventually baptized and proclaims that Jesus is the Son of God in the synagogues. We believe in a God who can do all things! Today, say a prayer for someone who is working against God. Kindly lift them up and ask God to be with them. *Today's readings: Acts 9:1–20; Psalm 117:1bc, 2; John 6:52–59.*

Saturday, May 10 St. John of Avila

St. John of Avila was born in the Castile region of Spain. He studied law, philosophy, and theology before he was ordained a diocesan priest. He inherited his parents' fortune and chose to distribute the inheritance to the poor. John came to be known as a great preacher and spiritual director, unafraid of denouncing evil. To celebrate his feast day, say a prayer in gratitude for the gifts (spiritual, financial, professional, and practical) that you have inherited from previous generations. How can you share your inheritance? *Today's readings: Acts* 9:31–42; *Psalm* 116:12–13, 14–15, 16–17; *John* 6:60–69.
