

# From the Pastor

My family has a long-standing tradition of visiting cemeteries. My dad's dad took up genealogy in his retirement so whenever he and my grandmother would come to visit, he'd take us to cemeteries trying to track down her family (who originally settled after immigration around Waconia) or some of his second cousins (my great-great grandfather's siblings stayed in Minnesota while he continued out to Red Lodge Montana to homestead). The point of that rather long introductory sentence is that I am used to cemeteries, and so it always entertains me when people act like I should be worried because I'm now living and working next to one. Cemeteries serve as an important way of remembering those who have gone before us - I cannot tell you how many times that I have stopped up at our cemetery as part of my rosary walk and told Frs. Pettigrew and Guillemette while passing by their graves that they need to pray for me since they created the building that I'm now responsible for maintaining. As we prepare to celebrate Memorial Day, we remember in a particular way those who died in service of our nation.

Mass is also a memorial of the redemptive work of our Lord Jesus Christ, but it is a particular type of memorial that I have previously talked about called anamnesis. Anamnesis is most commonly used outside of Catholic jargon as an antiguated word for medical history and just as your past health affects your current, so too is the passion, death, and resurrection of our Lord meant to impact us. The particular part of the mass called the memorial acclimation is said (usually sung at Sunday masses) right after the completion of the consecration. The priest sings or says "the mystery of faith" and the people respond by the memorial acclamation (of which there are currently three in English) to put the liturgical act in its context; to remind us that what we do at mass is a continuation of the saving work of Christ. This remembrance, this memorial isn't just meant for the mass, but something we live out always - that the saving work of Christ is meant to be continued in His Church, in us.

#### **CEMETERY FLOWERS AND MEMORIALS**

St. John's Cemetery Board wants to remind everyone of the following rules regarding placement of plants, flowers, and memorials on gravesites:

All flowers (live, silk, or plastic) must be placed in pots and are to be in plant stands inserted into the ground on the side of the monument. All plant stands should be placed so they are centered above the footstone as you are viewing the footstone. To help with the maintenance, we ask that plant stands be placed in a straight line. One plant stand and one solar light per monument/marker is allowed. Plant stands shall <u>not</u> be cemented in. Plant stands and shepherd's rods should be strong enough to support the plant weight and strong winds.

Live flowers in plant stands will be allowed to remain all summer if they are cared for. Silk and plastic flowers <u>in</u> <u>plant stands</u> will be allowed to remain as long as they look nice. Empty pots, dead plants/flowers and unsightly silk flowers will be removed at the Cemetery Manager's discretion. Plastic flowers, crosses, and other memorials (this includes plaques, rocks, toys, etc.) inserted directly in the ground or lying at ground level may be placed on graves a maximum of one week in advance of Memorial Day and will be removed one week after Memorial Day.

# **CATHOLIC Q & A**

#### SUNDAY MASS

**Question:** Why do Catholics need to go to Mass every Sunday?

**Answer:** The heart of the Church's instruction that we are to attend Mass on Sundays goes back to the Third Commandment: "Take care to keep holy the sabbath day as the LORD, your God, has commanded you" (Deuteronomy 5:12). Although the Jewish People celebrate the Sabbath on Saturday, the first generations of Christians began to observe the sabbath on Sunday, recognizing how important it is for Christians to celebrate the day that Jesus rose from the dead. As the United States Catholic Catechism for Adults observes, "Sunday extends the celebration of Easter throughout the year ... It makes present the new creation brought about by Christ" (364).

The focus of our Sunday should be the celebration of the Eucharist in the Mass. This is our time to be formed by God's Word and nourished at the table of the Lord, becoming prepared to live out and share our faith in the week that follows. In his encyclical, *Dies Domini*, Pope Saint John Paul II reminded us that Christians "cannot live their faith or share fully in the life of the Christian community unless they take part regularly in the Sunday Eucharistic assembly" (no. 81). This is why the Church teaches us that Sunday Mass is a non-negotiable part of being a Christian (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 2192).

Beyond being a time of worship, we should also remember that Sunday is intended to be a day of rest, when we make time for recreation, for sharing meals, and enjoying the company of friends and family. Sunday is given to us as a day to take stock of and enjoy the blessings that God has given us (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 2187). Pope Francis reminds us, "The day of rest, centered on the Eucharist, sheds its light on the whole week, and motivates us to greater concern for nature and the poor" (*Laudato Si'*, no. 237). ©LPi

# Sunday, May 25, 2025 The Guiding Spirit

*Today's readings: Acts 15:1–2, 22–29; Psalm 67:2–3, 5, 6, 8; Revelation 21:10–14, 22–23; John 14:23–29.* Next week, we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. This week, we hear Jesus remind the disciples that he will be "going away," or ascending. He tells them that, even though he is joining the Father, he is with them: "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you." The Holy Spirit is with us, too, inspiring us as we discern how to best respond to the call to be followers of Christ.

As the Easter season nears its end, prayerfully reflect on the ways the Holy Spirit has guided you. Begin your reflection by invoking the Holy Spirit. ("Come, Holy Spirit.") Light a candle, if possible. Where can you see God moving in your life? Consider the following: various settings that have moved or inspired you; conversations with friends or family that have helped clarify something for you; a passing thought or feeling that has resurfaced. Next, ask for the wisdom to respond!

The apostles were sent to pastorally respond to the needs of various communities. How have you been asked to respond to the needs around you? End your prayer by reading the Gospel passage. Sit with Jesus' words: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you."



# THIS WEEK AT HOME

### Monday, May 26 St. Philip Neri

St. Philip Neri, the founder of a religious community of priests and lay brothers called the Oratory, was known for his humor and holiness. Look back on your day. Did you greet others joyfully? Did you cheerfully fulfill your responsibilities? Pray for the ability to find joy in your daily tasks. ### **Tuesday, May 27** St. Augustine of Canterbury

Augustine was known as the "apostle of England." He led monks from Rome to England to evangelize the Anglo-Saxons. As they journeyed to England, they heard stories that instilled fear in them; Augustine was filled with doubt about the mission and returned to Rome. Pope Gregory the Great reassured them, and they set out again for England. When have you doubted your abilities? Ask God for the confidence you need to respond to him. *Today's readings: Acts 16:22–34; Psalm 138:1–2ab, 2cde–3, 7c–8; John 16:5–11.* 

## Wednesday, May 28 Truth

Jesus tells his disciples that "the Spirit of truth . . . will guide you to all truth." We know that the Spirit reveals the truth of God's glory to us. If possible, attend daily Mass. *Today's readings: Acts 17:15, 22—18:1; Psalm 148:1–2, 11–12, 13, 14; John 16:12–15.* 

# **Thursday, May 29** The Ascension

At Mass, we participate in the paschal mystery and are called to share the news of the miraculous events we witness. God accompanies us as we preach "in his name." The Holy Spirit strengthens us to joyfully accept the difficult yet transformative call to be followers of Christ. *Today's readings: Acts* 1:1–11; Psalm 47:2–3, 6–7, 8–9; Ephesians 1:17–23 or Hebrews 9:24–28; 10:19–23; Luke 24: 46–53.

# Thursday, May 29 St. Paul VI

In 1958, Pope John XXIII named Fr. Giovanni Battista Montini a cardinal. As cardinal, he helped prepare the Second Vatican Council. He was elected pope in June 1963. Pope Paul VI continued the Council, which reformed and renewed the Church. The Second Vatican Council called for the faithful's full and active participation in the liturgy. What does that mean to you? *Today's readings: Acts 18:1–8; Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; John 16:16–20.* 

## Friday, May 30 Laboring

Jesus tells his disciples that pain, weeping, and grieving will precede their joy. He likens the Christian journey to a woman in labor: she is first "in anguish because her hour has arrived," but then she "no longer remembers the pain because of her joy" once the child is born. This evening, hand your hardships and labor over to God. *Today's readings: Acts* 18:9–18; Psalm 47:2–3, 4–5, 6–7; John 16:20–23.

# Saturday, May 31 The Visitation

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. When Mary learns that her cousin Elizabeth is also pregnant, she travels to visit her. Upon hearing Mary, Elizabeth's baby leaps inside her womb and Elizabeth joy-fully exclaims the joy of Mary as the mother of the Lord. Who has celebrated joyous moments with you? Pray in gratitude for the ways they have accompanied you through growth and celebration. *Today's readings: Zephaniah 3:14–18a or Romans 12:9–16; Isaiah 12:2–3, 4bcd, 5–6; Luke 1:39–56.*
