From the Pastor

The last time I wore green vestments on a Sunday was March 2nd. After over a month in Ordinary Time, we are finally celebrating a Sunday of Ordinary Time this week, and we are doing so with I think the perfect readings for our return: Moses reminding the people that the ways of the Lord are not strange or removed from them, the parable of the Good Samaritan, and what we call the Colossians hymn - Paul is citing an earlier source (and since Paul is the earliest source that makes it really early like from the 30's or 40's).

The reason I find these so perfect is that we (as St. Benedict writes about in his rule) are called to find holiness in the ordinary aspects of daily life. God is not removed or distant from us and God the Son took on flesh so that we would know the nearness of the Lord and live out that union with the Lord in our daily lives. Loving our neighbors, our family, our coworkers isn't just meant to be something we do extraordinarily, but consistently, so that God's grace may perfect us and bring us more into union with His will. It's not always glamorous, but it is how we become who God made us to be.

In a few weeks, our parish will have one of my favorite demonstrations of this: our parish festival. We all volunteer a couple hours of our time on August 3 (and before, for all those who do the preparations) and we put on an event that reaches beyond our parish and extends to our entire community. It's a very clear example of how the total can become more than the sum of its parts and how the ordinary expression of love, of service can be made something greater. If you haven't already done so, I would highly encourage you to sign up for something. It's one very straightforward way of how in our ordinary God's grace may work within us.

CATHOLIC Q & A

WHAT IS MAMMON?

Question: When Jesus says, "*You cannot serve both God and mammon,"* what does he mean? What is mammon?

Answer: When you hear Scripture proclaimed each Sunday, remember it wasn't originally written in English. Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek — these ancient tongues were the original language of our Old and New Testaments. Most of the time, all of the words are translated into our native language. Sometimes, a word or two is left in the original language. Such is the case in this Scripture passage.

Mammon is an ancient Aramaic word referring to money, wealth, or profit. Earthly wealth isn't bad in itself, nor does it automatically exclude us from being a disciple of Jesus. But what dominates our life? To serve money — that is, to seek accumulation of wealth for its own sake and to structure our lives around it — is morally problematic. What good is our wealth if it isn't at the service of others? What good is our wealth if its pursuit leads us to selfishness, obsession, greed, envy, and comparison? There are many things that can be opposed to our service of God — power, prestige, popularity. Ultimately, something in our lives will be our master. But there is only one God worth serving.
